SHERR Communities of Practice and Action Update

We have now reached the half-way point in the collaborative work of the SHERR Communities of Practice and Action (CoPAs). All four groups, representing higher education institutions and resettlement agencies and affiliates, as well as federal and state government offices, have identified deliverables which will help fill some of the resource gaps within each topic area. We are excited to share the updates with you and appreciate everyone's active contributions. The groups are taking a break for the summer and will reconvene in September.

English Language Learning and Career Pathways Support (Facilitator: Olga Prizhbilov, Los Rios Community College District) | Session 4: June 11, 2024

- The group reviewed career pathways programs and services offered to support employment of refugee clients, including most in-demand career fields and trainings to increase employability and retention;
- Guest speaker Luana DeBorst, from <u>ECDC</u>, discussed the <u>Matching Grant</u> (MG) program as a federal funding source for economic self-sufficiency and employment support programming for refugees;
- Guest speaker Haji Shukran, from Opening Doors Sacramento, discussed his organization's partnership with Los Rios Community College District and programs they offer to support refugee clients with securing employment;
- The group started work on a toolkit with a listing of best curricula, teaching approaches, and resources that can be used in support of refugee-focused ELL & Career Pathways programs. When completed, this toolkit will be made available on the Refugee Resource Hub.

Housing and Campus Utilization (Facilitator: Dr. Diya Abdo, ECAR) | Session 4: June 10, 2024

The group discussed the role of trainings and consultations when establishing <u>ECAR chapters</u> and building new
partnerships with community partners to support housing for refugees on campus;







- Speakers from <u>ECAR</u>, <u>NASH RRI</u>, <u>Refugee Welcome Collective</u>, and <u>Refugee Housing Solutions</u> presented information about their resources related to campus housing for refugees, including guides for partnership building, sample MOUs, trainings, tenant toolkits, webinars, and more;
- The group discussed ideas for deliverables resources that fill existing gaps and which will support higher
 education institutions and resettlement agencies in collaboration around campus housing; any new resources and
 materials created by the SHERR Housing CoPA will be complementing and not duplicating the existing pool of
 resources; new materials will be made available through the <u>Refugee Resource Hub</u>.

Educational Opportunities: Reducing Barriers to Enrollment (Facilitator: Marina Chakmakchi, University of Southern Maine) | Session 4: June 12, 2024

- The group compiled the ways in which they collect and share refugee student success stories as well as ways in which they engage alumni;
- Their Story is Our Story shared about their approach and best practices in capturing and sharing refugee student stories;
- Members continued to discuss existing models of refugee student data collection and are exploring recommendations to address the general lack of available data.

Service Learning & Volunteer Engagement (Facilitator: Dr. Carina Black, Northern Nevada International Center @ University of Nevada Reno) | Session 4: June 17, 2024

- Rhiannon Kelly, from <u>Every Campus a Refuge</u>, shared about her work hosting an Alternative Spring Break
 opportunity for students focused on refugee resettlement as well as the vast resources that ECAR has for
 campuses interested in engaging in this work;
- The group is exploring how to map resettlement and higher education connected service learning/community
 engaged learning and related programs around the U.S., what would be included, and who would be the target
 audience(s);
- The group reviewed an outline of a toolkit that can serve as a resource for higher education institutions and resettlement agencies to partner in community engaged learning, internships, and volunteer engagement.

Ahead of World Refugee Day on June 20, 2024, U.S. Secretary of State Antony Blinken and U.S. Secretary of Education Dr. Miguel A. Cardona co-signed a <u>letter</u> addressed to the leadership of U.S. universities and colleges. The letter expresses appreciation to schools who have welcomed refugees on their campuses and encourages deepening the commitment on







the part of higher education institutions more broadly to engage with refugees and support resettlement efforts. We hope that this letter will help advance the conversation about higher education engagement in resettlement and bring new partners and commitments to the landscape.
