



- **3.Interprofessional Day-Refugee focus**
- 4.Nursing curriculum developed, taught and evaluated.







Experiential Learning in a Nursing Curriculum

Empathy

Explore refugees' lived experiences and build cultural humility.

Informing Professional Nursing Practice

Person-Centered Care

Deliver care that respects a person's background, culture, values, and needs.

Advocacy

Ensure refugee voices are heard, and they are empowered to make informed healthcare decisions.

Student Reflection

"...easier to understand someone when you have walked in their shoes."

"...bring more humility to the care we provide."

"Understand that people all over the world are going through something."

"A key takeaway is the importance of using trauma informed care."

"Very beneficial experience that gave new perspective on my worldview."

"Amazing experience, I think everyone should go through the simulation."

*Over the next 2 years, the partnership would expand to include 5 co-sponsor families, co-creating a training curriculum for interns, and engaging nursing students to support refugee health outcomes.

*Nursing students support by:

- -Bus training clients to clinic
- -Accompanying clients to appts
- -Office Hours for basic questions
- -Digital Literacy for telehealth
- -Develop client resources, such as "I speak" cards
- & medication management illustrations

The Refugee Health Navigator Program





The Refugee Health Navigator Program was developed to address common barriers to health care and to increase health systems comprehension for refugees. Students from different programs at Georgetown University are paired together and matched to a newly arrived family working with a resettlement agency. The program is intended to help remove the barriers to health care by identifying critical resources for newcomers, helping them navigate through health care services and systems, and promoting newcomer health.

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
